Future changes to the services for persons with Mental Health, Substance Abuse, & Intellectual Disability needs will be dramatic. Federal programs designed to reduce unnecessary hospital bed days will invite large hospital systems to collaborate in major reforms with the behavioral health system. NYS OMH continues plans to reduce long-term stay hospital beds & Medicaid Managed Care system change models reshape the health care landscape. All the while, keeping high quality patient care at the fore front of the rapid changes presents huge challenges to local behavioral health care. Genesee County remains committed to quality health care for all in need. This will require constant changes & adaptations.

As of January, 2015 New York State OMH instituted direct Regional Provider Services/Support. This includes funding to expand local provider networks. New funding from NYS OMH will allow local providers to hire and train "Peer Specialists".

Genesee County intends to initially monitor "level one" health screenings relating to patient weight, blood pressure, and bloodwork results. This data will be compiled to gauge success in reducing early at risk health factors, future medical and nursing needs.

Strategy 4.1

The Single Point of Access will identify all families and individuals presenting with Mental Health as well as Intellectual and other developmental disabilities. These individuals and families will be provided with enhanced linkages, referral information, and contact assistance within the new Medicaid Managed Care System. The intent is to provide these individuals and families with the tools to allow for a more structured navigation of the Managed Care provider network. Prior to providing enhanced linkages, referral information, and contact system Genesee County SPOA will advocate for OPWDD to provide assistance with provider agencies. The focus will remain assisting families in navigating services within the new Managed Care Model.

Metric: The Single Point of Access will identify all families and individuals presenting with Mental Health as well as Intellectual and other developmental disabilities. SPOA will track the disposition of interventions with affected families. SPOA will make a secondary contact with OPWDD and continue attempts at contact until progress is made.

In an attempt to meet the growing need for in-place services OPWDD has adapted the START program from a model out of New Hampshire. The START model provides for emergency treatment and respite strategies for persons with intellectual disabilities in crisis. Genesee County Mental Health will also advocate for additional respite options beyond the START program.

Metric: Genesee County Mental Health Services will provide referrals to the START program as well as track linkages for families/persons with Intellectual Disabilities to determine future trends. Due to limited START accessibility, Genesee County Mental Health will also advocate for broader services for families. Genesee County will also advocate for respite staff that are trained with a curriculum that is consistent.
